PLANNING AHEAD...

Religion is always in the news - but is the information given always reliable? You will learn to develop your skills to analyse and evaluate information to make decisions about the issues and problems that effect religious believers.

Unit 1: A Study of Religion

This unit provides you with the opportunity to undertake an in-depth and broad study of a chosen religion, covering themes ranging from religious figures

and sacred texts to practices that shape religious identity.

Unit 2 Section A : Religion and Ethics

This unit provides learners with the opportunity to undertake an in-depth and broad study of issues such as the significant concepts and the works of key thinkers to fundamental ethical themes, ranging from the application of ethical theories to issues such as the use of animal experimentation for medical research and immigration.

Unit 2 Section B: Philosophy of Religion

This section provides the opportunity for learners to acquire and develop knowledge and a critical understanding of some of the key features of fundamental philosophical themes, ranging from arguments for the existence of God to religious experience.

Unit 3

This unit provides learners with the opportunity to undertake an in-depth and broad study of issues such as the significant social and historical developments in theology or religious thought such as including the challenges of science, migration and the changing roles of men and women.

Unit 4

This unit provides learners with the opportunity to undertake an in-depth and broad

study of fundamental ethical themes, ranging from ethical language and thought to

freewill and determinism.

Unit 5

This unit provides learners with the opportunity to undertake an in-depth and broad study of fundamental philosophical themes, ranging from the rise of New Atheism to religious experience.

Unit 6

(Only available as an alternative to Unit 3 to those who studied AS Christianity in Year 12)

This unit provides learners with the opportunity to undertake an in-depth and broad study of issues ranging from modern scholarship's views on the biblical accounts of the miracles of Jesus to their views on Apocalyptic literature.

- You will learn how to write logically and to develop reasoned arguments.

- provide reasoning and/or evidence to support your arguments
- give a reasoned conclusion.
