### 1. Arrangements for Summer 2024

For the summer 2024 exam series, AS and A level qualifications will return to prepandemic approaches. This means that no advance information will be provided and there will not be a midway grading policy as there was in 2022 and 2023. Grades will be awarded in line with the summer 2019 outcomes.

#### **GCE English Literature**:

Please be aware that for Unit 3, Section B of the A level English Literature paper, the layout of the question will be slightly different in summer 2024. An example of how the summer 2023 question would have looked had the same layout been applied is below:

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

On the <u>Digital Resources</u> site, you will find resources for Blended Learning, Exam walk-throughs and Knowledge Organisers as well as resources focused on some of the key skills required for studying English Literature.

<u>Blended Learning Resources</u> have been written to support teachers and learners with the AS/A level qualification. These aim to support students in developing their understanding of different aspects of prose, poetry and drama, either working independently or as part of a curated programme put together by teachers to try to cover some learning remotely. They can also be used in the classroom and have been written by our Principal Examiners.

Written by Principal Examiners, the <u>Exam walk through</u> resources offer practical hints and tips on how to effectively approach questions in each examination paper. Using questions from 2019 exam papers, the PowerPoint with audio and script in the notes will walk you through a mock examination paper, helping students revise and practise useful exam techniques. Students can complete the "mock" in a single sitting, tackle one or two questions at a time or revisit some parts of the presentation to reinforce their learning. These could be used for revision or as a starting point for creating your own <u>knowledge organisers</u>.

In addition to those resources on the dedicated website, centres will find very useful material on the <u>WJEC secure website</u>, such as:

- how to increase learner confidence and engagement with poetry
- how to improve learner responses to exam questions requiring the reading and analysis of poetry
- exploring approaches to dealing with comparing unseen poetry in Unit 3.

#### 4. NEA

A number of you have been in touch to voice your concerns regarding candidates' possible use of AI (Artificial Intelligence) in their NEA.

You can find detailed guidance in the document <u>JCQ AI Use in Assessments: Protecting the Integrity of Qualifications</u>. Below is a summary of this guidance and suggestions to centres about preventing the misuse of AI in WJEC GCE English Language / English Language and Literature / English Literature NEA.

#### What is AI misuse in NEA?

Al misuse is candidates' use of Al tools, such as ChatGPT, to obtain and create content used in work produced for non-examined assessments which lead towards their qualification.

Any use of AI to create content for assessment is not permitted. Candidates must submit work for assessment which is their own, original work and which applies the knowledge, skills and understanding developed through their English qualifications. Any use of AI which means candidates have not independently produced their own, original work is malpractice.

Any work that is created by AI will not form part of the candidate's assessment and must be declared. Where it has been used to gather information, such as a summary of an article or an essay, candidates must provide a full acknowledgement of the content that was generated with the full name of the AI source and date the content was generated, e.g., ChatGPT 3.5 (https://openai.com/ blog/chatgpt/), 25/01/2023. Centres and candidates should be aware that poor referencing constitutes malpractice.

#### Whose responsibility is it to mitigate against AI use in NEA?

It is the centre's responsibility to ensure malpractice policies and procedures are updated and implemented. Assessors must not accept work which is not the candidate's own.



Ultimately, the Head of Centre has responsibility for ensuring candidates do not submit inauthentic work.

JCQ guidance states that centres should do the following:

- Explain the importance of candidates submitting their own independent work.
- Ensure the centre's malpractice policy includes misuse of Al.
- Reinforce to candidates the significance of their electronic declaration where they confirm their work is their own.
- Teachers are also required to authenticate candidate's work before it can be submitted for assessment.

#### Suggestions to prevent misuse of AI in NEA

Centres are advised to refer to qualifications' specifications' information about assessment evidence and authentication for information about what is required to appropriately authenticate work.

JCQ and WJEC recommend centres and teachers do the following to help prevent the misuse of AI in assessment:

- Consider restricting access to online AI tools on centre devices and networks.
- Allocate time for sufficient portions of written work (e.g., essays, creative writing, investigations) to be done in class under direct supervision.
- Allocate time for sufficient portions of preparatory work to be done in class under direct supervision.
- Examine intermediate / planning stages of production work and keep evidence of planning / draft work.
- Investigate instances where candidates produce work which is different to their usual style or quality.
- Do not accept work for assessment which it is suspected has been created by AI tools.

## 5. Opportunities

#### Poetry By Heart

To improve your learners' engagement with poetry, why not make use of and take part in the 2024 Poetry By Heart competition. Poetry By Heart is a national poetry speaking competition for schools and colleges. It's also a <u>website</u> for teaching and learning about poetry – by heart and out loud, and with plenty of choice for young people to explore poems and



find the ones that speak to them. Taking part in Poetry By Heart is all about developing confidence with poetry in an enjoyable, accessible and engaging way that leads to its lifelong enjoyment.

You can register and receive the Poetry By Heart competition-in-a-box which includes a calendar, posters and further resources for your classroom on their website.

#### **ESU**

Many of you will be familiar with the work of the <u>English</u> <u>Speaking Union</u>. They work with young people and the teachers to improve oracy skills and cross-cultural understanding, and run fun, games-led debate and public speaking curricula and workshops which encourage students to discuss a wide range of topical issues with an open mind. They guide schools on using oracy in the classroom and on



setting up and maintaining their own debate clubs; and provide teachers with a range of Continuing Professional Development opportunities in the fields of speech and debate. Nationally and internationally, they also run public speaking and debating competitions to hone the skills they provide, and offer a variety of cultural exchanges for students, teachers and professionals alike to build relationships and share ideas across communities and countries.

The skills which they develop are also integral to developing the creativity and structured thinking which we would expect to see in candidates' written work in their exams. You can find more information on their website.
