

AS/A level English Language, English Language and Literature, and English Literature Newsletter

We hope that you had a relaxing break over the summer period and that you and your students are feeling prepared for the new academic year. In this term's newsletter, we have some general and subject-specific updates and information that you may need as you begin this new academic year.

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1. Summer 2023 results

The hard work of students and teachers across the country was obvious in the responses that were marked and moderated by WJEC appointees this summer; you and your students should be very proud of everything that has been achieved.

The papers and mark schemes from the summer 2023 series are now available to view on our <u>secure website</u>. If you don't have access, please contact your exams officer.

Remember that 28 September is the last date for requesting a review of marking or moderation and for requesting electronic copies of scripts for teaching and learning purposes. Please see our <u>website</u> for more details.

You can find a range of helpful information in our <u>Guide to summer 2023 Results and</u> <u>Appeals.</u> Applications for an appeal must be submitted within 30 calendar days of WJEC issuing the outcome of the review. Any applications or requests received after this date will not be accepted.

For the summer 2023 series, a free, unannotated scripts service is available for:

- WJEC GCE English Language (2700U10-1, 2700U20-1, 1700U30-1 and 1700U40-1)
- WJEC GCE English Language and Literature (2710U10-1, 2710U20-1, 1710U30-1, 1710U40-1).
- WJEC GCE English Literature (2720U10-1, 2720U20-1, 1720U30-1, 1720U40-1).

Centres can download scripts on behalf of candidates via WJEC's secure website which also includes instructions on the process. Please note that a centre must obtain the candidate's permission prior to downloading or applying for a script. Scripts will be available for 6 months from results day.



2. Analysing candidates' results

WJEC offers two services to help you understand your students' results and develop exam skills in your next cohort: Exam Results Analysis and Online Exam Review.

Exam Results Analysis on the <u>secure website</u> allows you to compare your students' performance on each question with that of the candidature overall, letting you see where they have done well and where there might be room for improvement.

You can find the Online Exam Review (OER) which provides a number of clean and marked exemplars of candidate responses to key questions on our <u>subject-specific pages</u> on the website. Click on 'Key Documents' from the menu and scroll down to find the 'Exemplar' folder to access the examples from the summer 2023 exam series and all previous series. These allow students to mark others' work and discuss ways in which it may be improved, thus developing their own skills.

3. Principal Examiner Reports

The Principal Reports for GCE <u>English Language English Language and Literature</u>, and <u>English Literature</u> providing feedback on the Summer 2023 series are now available on the website subject pages. You are advised to read them carefully as they provide helpful observations and commentary on candidates' work this series, including characteristics of successful responses, areas of improvement and advice to centres.

In a change to this year's Principal Examiner Reports, you will find links to resources based on some key points raised in each report. We hope that you find this additional support helpful as you prepare learners for the 2024 exam series.

4. Moderators' Reports

The Moderator Report on the work submitted by your centre for NEA this summer is now available on the <u>secure website</u>. Please take the time to read this important document as it contains feedback on your centre's performance and advice for next year's submission. Please ensure you download your report as soon as possible as they will be removed from the secure website at the end of the year.

Knowledge Organisers: written by Sara Thorne, a collection of sample knowledge organisers to support the learning of A level Language covering open word classes, phrases and spoken language.


These could be used for revision or as a starting point for creating your own knowledge organisers.



These have been developed so that they can support learners who are either working independently or as part of a curated programme put together by teachers to try to cover some learning remotely. They can also be used in the classroom and have been written by senior examiners and current teachers.

GCE English Literature:

Click on 'Training' from the menu and then on 'Materials from previous events' to access these. They include the materials focusing on poetry from autumn 2019 to support you with Unit 2 and Unit 3. On the **Digital Resources** site, you will find resources for

Blended Learning, Exam walk-throughs and Knowledge Organisers as well as resources focused on some of the key skills required for studying English Literature.

<u>Blended Learning Resources</u> have been written to support teachers and learners with the AS/A level qualification. These aim to support students in developing their understanding of different aspects of prose, poetry and drama, either working independently or as part of a curated programme put together by teachers to try to cover some learning remotely. They can also be used in the classroom and have been written by our Principal Examiners.

Written by Principal Examiners, the <u>Exam walk through</u> resources offer practical hints and tips on how to effectively approach questions in each examination paper. Using questions from 2019 exam papers, the PowerPoint with audio and script in the notes will walk you through a mock examination paper, helping students revise and practise useful exam techniques. Students can complete the "mock" in a single sitting, tackle one or two questions at a time or revisit some parts of the presentation to reinforce their learning. These could be used for revision or as a starting point for creating your own <u>knowledge organisers</u>.

In addition to those resources on the dedicated website, centres will find very useful material on the <u>WJEC secure website</u>, such as:

- previous A level CPD material: including lots of practical, classroom-focused activities
- NEA Standardising Material: videos and commentaries to help internal standardisation of NEA work
- past papers and mark schemes.

Each subject expert-led session will:

- provide an in-depth look at key points from our Principal Examiner reports.

- suggest strategies to improve learner outcomes in future assessments.
- allow you to ask questions directly to our subject experts.

These valuable insights will allow you to better prepare future learners for success.
